



Student Code of Conduct

Brunel University London is a great place to live, study, work and socialise and it's up to all of us to make sure it stays that way. We are proud of our inclusive, diverse, and supportive community, and work in partnership together to encourage and promote a happy, safe and secure environment for staff, students and visitors. In fostering a culture of courtesy, tolerance, and kindness, we demonstrate our commitment to ensuring high standards of behaviour in our work, study, research and social activity, both on and off campus, and whether online or in person.

As members of our community, please act responsibly and considerately and encourage others to do so as well. If any of our students behave in a way that adversely affects the wellbeing and safety of others, either on campus or in the wider community, we will take action to protect everyone else.

We expect good conduct from all our students and have clear expectations around this. Good Conduct

Good conduct involves being aware of your own behaviour and attitudes and the impact that your actions, or the things you say, or write, could have on other people. It means taking responsibility for your behaviour, acting with consideration and courtesy towards

others, and understanding that there may be negative consequences if your behaviour is unacceptable and upsets others. As a Brunel student, good conduct applies anywhere and at any time, including in the local community around campus, in halls of residence, in your online activity, such as in your formal teaching space or in the library, or when using social media, whilst on placement, and whilst engaged in any other Brunel-related activity, such as a club or society event.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Upholding and committing to the Brunel University London Community Pledge. • Acting responsibly and honestly. • Being considerate and kind and treating others with patience and compassion. • Behaving courteously and professionally towards others so that they are not harassed, bullied, discriminated against, judged or stigmatised. • Welcoming and understanding our diversity, particularly in relation to sex, gender, race, sexual orientation, religious belief or faith, age, disability, or gender identity. • Looking out for and supporting other students and, where possible and safe to do so, challenging unacceptable behaviour. • Using Report & Support to inform the University of any unacceptable conduct which you notice or experience, or calling the Security 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Following the rules laid down by campus-based services, such as the Library and the Computing Service. • Being punctual for classes and other appointments. • Showing consideration for others regarding noise, including switching mobile phones off in classes, listening attentively to the lecturer and not engaging in disruptive behaviour. • Ensuring that in all academic work, you act with academic integrity; meaning you do not plagiarise, cheat, contract cheat, collude with others, or engage in research misconduct as defined in the Academic Misconduct Procedure. • Exhibiting appropriate standards of professional behaviour, including on placement. • Being proactive in seeking the support and advice you may need to assist with your academic studies, including 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Treating property belonging to the University and other people with care and consideration. • Playing your part in maintaining security and being prepared to produce your student identity card when requested by a staff member who identifies themselves. • Caring for the environment at Brunel by respecting buildings, spaces, and facilities, and recycling and disposing of litter responsibly. • Following Health and Safety rules and guidance • Showing consideration for the welfare of your friends and other students, and, if appropriate, providing advice on seeking help, including suggesting they report any concerns to the University using Report & Support.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Not complying with the Student Code of Conduct; Breaking the law Threatening or engaging in violence, harassment, hate crime, bullying or abuse, either physically, verbally, or online, such in the use of social media, including identifiable private accounts; Sexual misconduct, such as sexual harassment, sexual assault, sexual abuse and any conduct of a sexual nature that is unwanted, including conduct online and on social media; The possession, use or supply of drugs (including the misuse of prescription drugs or legal highs); The possession or use of weapons; Anti-social behaviour, including anti-social behaviour arising from intoxication from alcohol or drugs; Damaging or stealing property and theft; Unauthorised entry onto or unauthorised use of premises; Inappropriate use of IT equipment, the University network, the Internet or social media, including inappropriate messaging or posting on both personal, or University-related chat or message groups, visiting inappropriate websites, uploading/downloading inappropriate content and the transmission of computer viruses; 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Plagiarism; Unpermitted recycling / re-using work; Cheating; Collusion; Contract Cheating; Research Misconduct; Submitting fraudulent extenuating circumstances claims or falsifying evidence in support of extenuating circumstances claims or academic appeals; Breaches of any University rules, regulations, policies or procedures relating to academic activity or assessment; Failing, without good reason, to cooperate in the University's process of assessment;

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Failing to disclose relevant criminal convictions in line with the Admissions Policy; • Preventing or interfering with lawful freedom of speech or belief, or failing to uphold the principles of the University's Freedom of Speech Statement; • Behaviour which damages the good name of the University, such as inconsiderate or anti-social behaviour in the local community; • Causing a Health and Safety concern. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Providing work to websites/repositories where the purpose is for the work to be shared, and/or selling work for any sort of gain (financial, work in kind, credit or similar) in order to facilitate an unfair academic advantage.
