

Student Code of Conduct

Brunel University London is a great place to live, study, work and socialise and it's up to all of us to make sure it stays that way. We are proud of our inclusive, diverse, and supportive community, and work in partnership together to encourage and promote a happy, safe and secure environment for staff, students and visitors. In fostering a culture of courtesy, tolerance, and kindness, we demonstrate our commitment to ensuring high standards of behaviour in our work, study, research and social activity, both on and off campus, and whether online or in person.

As members of our community, please act responsibly and considerately and encourage others to do so as well. If any of our students behave in a way that adversely affects the wellbeing and safety of others, either on campus or in the wider community, we will take action to protect everyone else.

We expect good conduct from all our students and have clear expectations around this. All students when enrolling at Brunel agree to adhere to the University rules and regulations on academic and non-academic misconduct, and fitness to practise: <u>Senate</u> <u>Regulation 6: Student Conduct (Academic and Non-Academic)</u> and <u>Senate Regulation 14: Fitness to Practise.</u>

Good Conduct

Good conduct involves being aware of your own behaviour and attitudes and the impact that your actions, or the things you say, or write, could have on other people. It means taking responsibility for your behaviour, acting with consideration and courtesy towards others, and understanding that there may be negative consequences if your behaviour is unacceptable and upsets others. As a Brunel student, good conduct applies anywhere and at any time, including in the local community around campus, in halls of residence, in your online activity, such as in your formal teaching space or in the library, or when using social media, whilst on placement, and whilst engaged in any other Brunel-related activity, such as a club or society event.
